Sir,

The 2006 Annual Report of the Springfield Police Division is respectfully submitted. This report provides a summary of the activities and accomplishments of the division.

The Police Division responded to 64,536 calls for police service in 2006. Our busiest hour each day, on average, was from 5 pm to 6 pm. Our quietest- 6 am to 7 am. For the third year in a row we have seen a decline in all calls for service. Calls for service were down 3.17%, from the prior year. Domestic Violence calls continue to be the most prevalent calls for police service, in all sectors of the city.

The Investigations Unit reports some of the highlights from 2006:

We regret to report that there were four homicides that occurred in 2006. All four have been solved and arrests have been made.

The Narcotics Unit investigated 123 major cases, in 2006. Most of these cases were crack-cocaine investigations. Prescription drugs were the second most frequent drug investigation. The total amounts of drugs seized during the arrests or execution of the search warrants are as follows-

1. Cocaine- 667.4 grams
2. Crack Cocaine- 484.9 grams
3. Heroin- 70 unit doses
4. Marijuana- 534.7 grams
5. Handguns- 17
6. Rifles- 3
7. Shotguns- 5
8. Prescription pills- 15, 874
9. Vehicles (Forfeited)- 6
10. U.S. Currency- \$157,597.00

*(Note-These totals do not include drugs or property seized during regular police activities.)*

The Special Operations Team conducted eight (8) raids during 2006. All were drug related.

A series of business robberies occurred in September, October and November of 2006 (39 in all). Arrests of eight men were made (one group of 3, one group of 5) related to these robberies.

A major sex offender was arrested in 2006. During a search warrant of his home, approximately 175 suspicious videotapes were recovered. The tapes would later be used to convict this offender on sixteen (16) sex related crimes, including unlawful sexual conduct with a minor.

A local business reported the theft of over \$95,000.00. It was determined through the investigation that a trusted leader of the business had embezzled the money. An arrest was made and the suspect is scheduled for trial in early 2007.

The Internet intervention program was productive in 2006. The Division recorded twenty-seven (27) arrests of Internet sexual predators during the year. This brings the total number of arrests related to this program to fifty-three (53), since the program began in 2004.

After several months of training, the Police Canine Unit was put into operation on May 29, 2006. Officer Michael Fredendall is the handler. "Rambo" is a two-year-old Belgian Malinois dog. He was obtained from the

Netherlands with funds from private donations totaling over \$16,000.00. Officer Michael Fredendall and “Rambo” have proven to be a very valuable resource for the division. The following statistics are hereby reported:

The Police Division applied for and received the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) in 2006. This grant was written for the following:

1. Thermal Imaging Device
2. Voice Transforming Device
3. Braking test computer (See Traffic section)
4. Update training equipment in the main training room, as well as secondary training facility.
5. Stop Sticks
6. “Redman” training suit.

The total amount of the grant is \$26,247.50. The Division will be responsible for the cost of this equipment that is in excess of the grant. That amount is \$6.02.

In addition to the previously listed new equipment, 2006 also brought five cruiser cameras. They were purchased using the “255 OMVI Education and Enforcement Fund.” This fund is generated by a portion of the fines paid by those convicted of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of

alcohol and/or drugs. The fines are then distributed to the City by the Clerk of the Municipal Court and used for DUI enforcement or education. Each camera cost \$5,000.00. The Division is currently exploring the possibility of adding two (2) additional cameras in 2007.

“Stop Sticks” were purchased with money from the JAG grant and have been placed in cruisers. Officer training on these devices was nearly complete, by the end of 2006. Training will conclude in January 2007. “Stop Sticks” are used to deflate the tires of a vehicle driven by a wanted offender, when that offender is attempting to elude police or the offender is driving with reckless regard for the safety of others. The “Stop Sticks” cost \$389.00 each and seven were purchased.

Tasers were purchased in 2006, using the JAG grant from 2005. These twenty (20) Tasers, and related equipment, cost \$23,261.50. The Tasers are expected to be in operation in early 2007. Tasers are a non-lethal restraint tool, used to bring resisting subjects under control. The JAG grant was also used to purchase a recording system for the public safety building at a cost of \$18,500.00.

The Mobile Data Terminals (MDT) were purchased in 2006. Installation of the 55 units into the cruisers has begun. These cruiser-mounted computers will bring instant information to the patrol officers on the street. This will not only increase efficiency, officer safety will also be improved. These MDT’s were purchased using a federal grant that was awarded to the City of Springfield. After installation is complete, training of officers will begin. It is expected that the MDT’s will be fully functional in early 2007. The total first year cost of the MDT’s is \$835,000.00.



The Division also received a grant from the Governor's Highway Safety Board. This grant was for High Visibility Overtime Enforcement during heavy events (homecoming, prom, holidays, etc.). The total amount of this grant was \$23,084.90 (October- October). There were 829 traffic related arrests made in 2006 with the use of this overtime.

The D.A.R.E. officers were very busy during 2006. There were 693 fifth graders, 711 seventh graders and approximately 650-second graders that received D.A.R.E. instruction during 2006. These numbers not only include the public schools, but also the private schools. In addition to the regular curriculum, the D.A.R.E. officers continued the K.I.C.K.S program. This program, an after school activity, teaches children the art and discipline of the martial arts. This program averages about 25 children. There were also three D.A.R.E. festivals and two skating parties. Each of these events averaged 200 children. Also, the Safety City program was offered again during this year. The Pilot Club sponsors this program. Approximately 400 children attended in the summer of 2006. The D.A.R.E. officers also walked in the Memorial parade with the School Safety Patrol, rounding out that day with the Safety Patrol picnic held in Snyder Park. Approximately 70 children participated in this activity. The D.A.R.E. officers were also involved in the Seat Belt program, which trained 473 children in the proper use of seat belts.



The School Resource Officers (4) continued their work in 2006. In addition to their regular school activities, they conducted the "Every 15 Minutes" program, which reminds children of the dangers of drunk driving. They were also involved in the Safe Schools Task Force, the Safe

Community Coalition and the Core Crisis Intervention Team. Classes on bullying were also conducted. During the summer of 2006, the School Resource Officers were reassigned to Uniform Patrol, where they assisted with day-to-day operations, with a brief break for Bike Camp. Bike Camp is a weeklong program that promotes bicycle safety. Approximately 40 children participated this year.



The Traffic Investigation Unit remained busy in 2006. Unfortunately, we report seven traffic fatalities occurring in 2006. Six of these fatalities were single unit accidents. Only one death was alcohol related, three victims were not wearing seatbelts, two were on motorcycles. The average age of the victims was 44 years old.

The Traffic Unit did acquire a new piece of equipment in 2006, thanks to the Edward Byrne Memorial Grant. This equipment, the VC3000, allows investigators to test the surfaces for drag factors. This allows investigators to establish vehicle speed. This aids in the reconstruction of serious injury and fatal accidents. The VC3000 had a price tag of \$3,000.00.

There were 747 hit-skip accidents reported in 2006, down from 813 in 2005. Of these accidents, 39% or 276 were solved. This is well above the national average.

There were just over 900 vehicles towed during 2006 for various reasons, including junk vehicles towed from private property.



The Safelight Springfield Program made its debut on April 28, 2006. After a month of warning letters being mailed, civil fines began being issued on May 28, 2006. This program monitors red light violations with the use of 17 cameras at the 10 most accident producing intersections. Over a four-year period, those intersections include:

1. Limestone St. @ Leffels Ln.
2. Limestone St. @ John St.
3. Spring St. @ North St.
4. Main St. @ Belmont Ave.
5. Main St. @ Burnett Rd.
6. Spring St. @ High St.
7. Limestone St. @ Home Rd.
8. Limestone St. @ McCreight Ave.
9. Bechtle Ave. @ Ste. Rte 41
10. Bechtle Ave. @ Ste Rte 40

The Redflex Corporation in Scottsdale, Arizona manages the program. In 2006, there were 12,206 red light tickets issued.

The Community Response Team was also busy in 2006. The fifth Citizen Academy, sponsored by Allstate Insurance, graduated on November 30, 2006. This brings the total number of Academy graduates to 102 citizens. The graduates of the Academy formed an official Alumni Association on April 18, 2006, when they applied for a federal tax identification number. In addition to holding monthly meetings, the Alumni Association was very active in 2006 by assisting the Division in the following activities:

1. Memorial Day parade- assisted with traffic control at several intersections.
2. Culturefest- assisted officers with manning the booth and talking with citizens.
3. School Safety picnic- assisted with food and activities for the children.

4. Swim with the Cops program- assisted with food and activities for the children.
5. D.A.R.E. festivals- helped officers with activities
6. Clark County Fair- manned the fair booth with officers, assisting with questions and the raffle. They also promoted the Citizen's Academy, bringing several new applications for the fall class.
7. Operation Thanksgiving- assisted in shopping and delivery of Thanksgiving food for 10 families and 10 elderly people.
8. Operation Santa- assisted in shopping and wrapping for 14 families and 10 elderly people for the holiday. Operation Santa assisted with a record 43 children this year.



The Women's Self Defense Program continued in 2006 with two additional classes graduating from the six-hour course. Security National Bank requested that a class be given to their employees, which was conducted in October 2006. After receiving the training, the bank has decided to sponsor the program by providing advertising, food and beverages to future classes.



The Community Response team also kicked off the Internet Safety Program to the public and to the schools. Presentations were given to school age children, parents and teachers to help develop habits that promote safety while using the Internet. This program is expected to continue into 2007.

The Division continues to be involved in the “Miami Valley’s Most Wanted” program and it is anticipated that we will become involved in “Crimestoppers” in 2007.



Major Crime is categorized by the Federal Bureau of Investigation Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) System into Index and Non-Index Crime. The number of Class One Crime Index Offenses, reported to this division, decreased 2.49% from 2005 to 2006, the number of Class One Offenses reported are down 8.75% from the high reported in 2002. It should be noted that Adult criminal arrests, made by this division are up 25.58% since 2002.

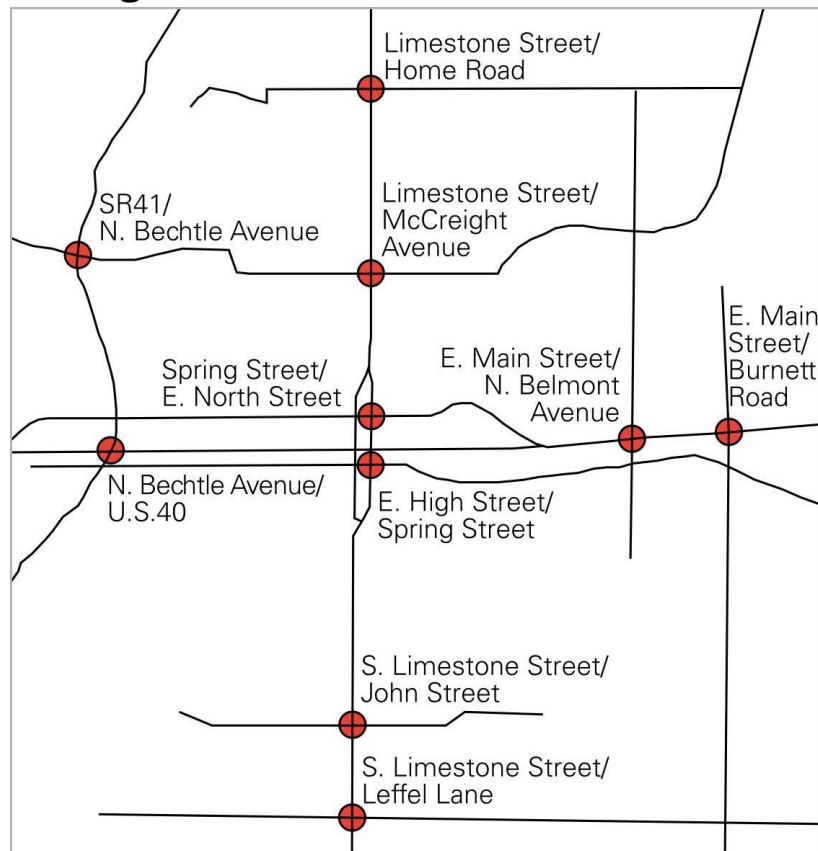
