Citizens of Springfield and Elected Officials,

The 2007 Annual Report of the Springfield Police Division is respectfully submitted. 2007 marked the 140<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Springfield Police Division (1867-2007) and contained in this report are numerous *historical* photos from the Division's history. This report also provides a summary of the activities and accomplishments of the division.

The Police Division responded to 63,113 calls for police service in 2007 and there were another 14,832 officer initiated calls for a grand total of 77,945 calls for service. Our busiest hour each day, on average, was from 5 pm to 6 pm. Our quietest- 6 am to 7 am. For the fourth year in a row we have seen a decline in all calls for service. Calls for service were down 2.25% from 2006. Theft and burglary were the two most reported crimes in 2007 for the fifth consecutive year. .

Also, for the fifth straight year, auto theft, robbery and aggravated assault rounded out the top five reported crimes in the city. In 2007, 3,663 thefts were reported, down from 3,872 the previous year, a 5.4 percent decrease.

Burglary was second on the list with 1,434, down 27.7 percent from the 1,984 reports taken in 2006, last year's biggest drop.

The total number of "Class I" crimes — murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft and auto theft — is down 12.9 percent from 2006.

Other most-frequent crimes in Springfield in 2007:

- Auto theft, 417, down 16.7 percent from 501 in 2006
- Robbery, 245, down 20.9 percent from 310 in 2006

- Aggravated assault, 187, up 12 percent from 167 in 2006, the only increase in the top-five list.

Rape was also down last year with 50 reports, down 16.7 percent from 60 reports in 2006.

The biggest increase in 2007 was murder, which more than doubled, with nine reports in 2007 to four in 2006.

Domestic Violence continues to be the most prevalent call for police service, in all sectors of the city.

The Police Division has teamed up with the U.S. Marshals service in an attempt to capture violent felons. SPD has one officer assigned to the "SOFAST" task force, which is expected to be active until late 2008. Though it has taken one officer off the streets, many more officers, on the federal level, are in our community. This program started in late 2007 and officers have already made 14 arrests in Springfield alone.

In late 2007 we began the process of becoming accredited through "CALEA" (Commission for Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies). This accreditation enforces a law enforcement standard to insure the highest quality of police service to our community. The process is lengthy and we expect to spend much of 2008 working toward this goal.

The Investigations Unit reports some of the highlights from 2007:

We regret to report that there were nine homicides that occurred in 2007. Two of those cases were ruled self-defense. Four of those deaths have been resolved with arrests being made. The remaining three cases are still under investigation.

The Narcotics Unit reports the following drugs/ property seizures:

1. Cocaine- 1510.9 grams (3.3 pounds)

\*The above totals do not include narcotics purchased from controlled buys.

The following totals are from information we obtained during an investigation that started in Springfield and led to Fairborn. The Ace Task Force was contacted and they obtained a search warrant, based on our information, which they recovered the following:

- \$60,000.00 Cash
- 6 Kilo's of Cocaine (13.2 lbs) (5992.8 Grams)
- 16 lbs of Marijuana (7264 Grams)

*(Note-These totals do not include drugs or property seized during regular police activities.)*

The Special Operations Team conducted ten (10) drug related raids in 2007. They also responded to two reports of barricaded subjects. All SOT activities report no injuries to suspects or to officers.

The Internet intervention program was productive in 2007. The Division recorded ten (10) arrests of Internet sexual predators during the year. This brings the total number of arrests related to this program to sixty-five (65), since the program began in 2004.

The canine unit marked it's one year of service in 2007. Officer M. Fredendall and "Rambo" train weekly with other canine units in the area. "Rambo" has repeatedly demonstrated an outstanding talent for patrol and drug detection. The following statistics are hereby reported:

The Police Division applied for, and received, the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) in 2007. This grant was written for the following:

1. Airsoft weapon system (used for firearms training)- \$4159.88
2. Gas launcher and accessories (Special Operations)- \$3658.45
3. Case for the launcher and munitions- \$460.10
4. Tactical ballistic blanket (Special Operations)- \$2076.00
5. Tactical backpack (Special Operations)- \$394.00
6. Single sided I.D. system (Ident-i-Kid)- \$4397.95
7. Live ID workstation (Identity verification)- \$7,000.00
8. Laser Shot Training System (firearms training)- \$23,984.50
9. 17” LCD Monitor (Property room)- \$149.99
10. 20” LCD Monitor with Articulating Arm (Book-In) \$273.99

The total amount of the grant is \$46,554.86.

The in-cruiser cameras have proved beneficial in several investigations, including an active shooter, and his eventual apprehension. Each camera cost \$5,000.00. The cameras were paid for using OVI Education and Enforcement Grant. Two additional cameras were added in 2007.

“Stop Sticks” were purchased with money from the 2006 JAG grant and were placed in cruisers. Officer training on these devices was completed in 2007. “Stop Sticks” were deployed twice during 2007. “Stop Sticks” are used to deflate the tires of a vehicle driven by a wanted offender, when that offender is attempting to elude police or the offender is driving with reckless regard for the safety of others.

Tasers were purchased in 2006, using the JAG grant from 2005. These twenty (20) Tasers, and related equipment, cost \$23,261.50. The Taser training will begin in late January 2008. The Tasers are expected to be in operation at that time. Tasers are a non-lethal restraint tool, used to bring resisting subjects under control.

The Mobile Data Terminals (MDT) have been installed in all cruisers and are operational at this time. Basic reports have been made available on the mobile units. These cruiser-mounted computers bring instant information to the patrol officers on the street. This will not only increase efficiency,

officer safety will also be improved. These MDT's were purchased using a federal grant that was awarded to the City of Springfield.

The Division also received a grant from the Governor's Highway Safety Board. This grant was for High Visibility Overtime Enforcement during heavy events (homecoming, prom, holidays, etc.). The total amount of this grant was \$27,073.91 (October- October). There were 664 traffic related arrests made in 2007 with the use of this overtime.

Snyder Park Golf Course, a part of National Trails, donated a golf cart to the Police Division. Retired CCSO Sgt. Dan Loney painted and pinstriped the cart and a light bar was added by the city garage. The cart will be used for various police activities.



The D.A.R.E. officers were very busy during 2007. There were 781 fifth graders, 627 seventh graders and 857-second graders that received D.A.R.E. instruction during 2007. These numbers not only include the public schools, but also the private schools. In addition to the regular curriculum, the D.A.R.E. officers continued the K.I.C.K.S program. This program, an after school activity, teaches children the art and discipline of the martial arts. This program averages about 25 children. There were also two D.A.R.E. festivals and three skating parties. Each of these events averaged 200 children. Also, the Safety City program was offered again during this year. The Pilot Club sponsors this program. Approximately 300 children attended in the summer of 2007. The D.A.R.E.

officers also walked in the Memorial Day parade with the School Safety Patrol, rounding out that day with the Safety Patrol picnic held in Snyder Park. Approximately 70 children participated in this activity. The D.A.R.E. officers were also involved in the Seat Belt program, which trained 857 children in the proper use of seat belts.



The School Resource Officers had a change in late 2007. Officer Phillip Belcher joined the group. He took over Keifer, Clark and Hayward Middle Schools. The four SRO's continued their work in 2007. In addition to their regular school activities, they conducted the "Every 15 Minutes" program, which reminds children of the dangers of drunk driving. They did

this program at Northwestern High School this year. The program will be done at the new Springfield High School in 2008. They were also involved in the Safe Schools Task Force, the Safe Community Coalition and the Core Crisis Intervention Team. Classes on bullying were also conducted by Officer Embry. The program is expected to be expanded in 2008. During the summer of 2007, the School Resource Officers were reassigned to Uniform Patrol, where they assisted with day-to-day operations, with a brief break for Bike Camp. Bike Camp is a weeklong program that promotes bicycle safety. Four separate bike camps were conducted in 2007, with 72 children participating. Officer Lyle conducted bicycle training to the Wittenberg police officers in the summer of 2007. The SRO's also conducted a pre-prom anti-drinking program, seat belt program, the Gordon Foods bike rodeo and were actively involved in the professional bike race that was held downtown in the summer of 2007. Officer Lyle is looking forward to another Gordon Foods bike rodeo in the summer of 2008. These rodeos provide bicycle training to young people, with an emphasis on safety and the use of helmets. The SRO's are further looking at some active shooter training to be offered in the summer of 2008. The School Resource Officers have been heavily involved in the consolidation process for the new high school.

Unfortunately, the Traffic Investigation Unit remained busy again in 2007. We report five traffic fatalities occurring this year. Three of the deaths were alcohol related, two of the victims were not wearing seatbelts. The average age of the victims was 42 years old.

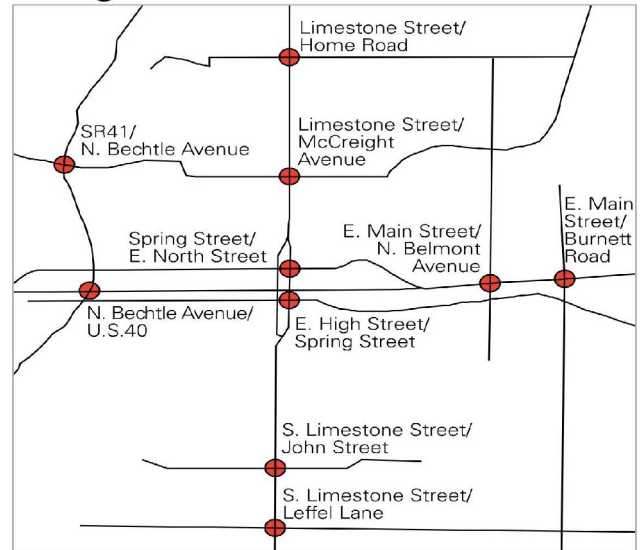
There were 715 hit-skip accidents reported in 2007, down from 747 in 2006. Of these accidents, 39.3% or 281 were solved. This is well above the national average.



The Safelight Springfield Program made its debut on April 28, 2006. After a month of warning letters being mailed, civil fines began being issued on May 28, 2006. This program monitors red light violations with the use of 17 cameras at the 10 most accident producing intersections. Over a four-year period, those intersections include:

1. Limestone St. @ Leffels Ln.
2. Limestone St. @ John St.
3. Spring St. @ North St.
4. Main St. @ Belmont Ave.
5. Main St. @ Burnett Rd.
6. Spring St. @ High St.
7. Limestone St. @ Home Rd.
8. Limestone St. @ McCreight Ave.
9. Bechtle Ave. @ Ste. Rte 41
10. Bechtle Ave. @ Ste Rte 40

The Redflex Corporation in Scottsdale, Arizona manages the program. In 2007, there were 17,924 red light tickets issued. Ste. Rte 41 @ N. Bechtle has the highest number of violations recorded with 5346 tickets issued. The least number of tickets (100) were issued is at the intersection of N. Belmont @ E. Main St.

The Community Response Team (CRO's) was also busy in 2007. The sixth and seventh Citizen Academy, sponsored by Allstate Insurance, graduated this year. This brings the total number of Academy graduates to 132 citizens. The graduates of the Academy formed an official Alumni Association on April 18, 2006, when they applied for a federal tax identification number. In 2007, they applied for 501(C)3 status, making them tax exempt. In addition to holding monthly meetings, the Alumni Association was very active in 2007 by assisting the Division in the following activities:

1. Memorial Day parade- assisted with traffic control at several intersections.
2. Culturefest- assisted officers with manning the booth and talking with citizens.
3. School Safety picnic- assisted with food and activities for the children.
4. Two D.A.R.E. festivals- helped officers with activities.
5. Clark County Fair- manned the fair booth with officers, assisting with questions and a raffle. They also promoted the Citizen's Academy, bringing several new applications for the fall class.
6. Operation Thanksgiving- assisted in shopping and delivery of Thanksgiving food for 10 families and 10 elderly people.
7. Operation Santa- assisted in shopping and wrapping for 17 families and 10 elderly people for the holiday. Operation Santa assisted with a record 50 children this year.

- 9. Safety Fair
- 10. Traffic School
- 11. Flu Clinic
- 12. Food Baskets for a local church



The Women's Self Defense Program continued in 2007 with two additional classes graduating from the six-hour course.



The Division continues to be involved in the "Miami Valley's Most Wanted" program and became officially involved with "Crime stoppers" in 2007. We anticipate the use of "Crime stoppers" to assist us in the unsolved homicides (18) from 1966-2007.

The CRO's are actively involved in CONA, Neighborhood Watch, Internet Safety, Identity Theft, Elderly Victimization programs, including being involved in TRIAD, a program that works with local senior organizations toward reducing crime toward seniors. The CRO's also worked on Halloween Safety and Graffiti issues. The CRO unit was active in 2007, attempting to develop a Community Center at 17 W. Johnny Lytle. The CRO's were also involved in the training of new recruits.

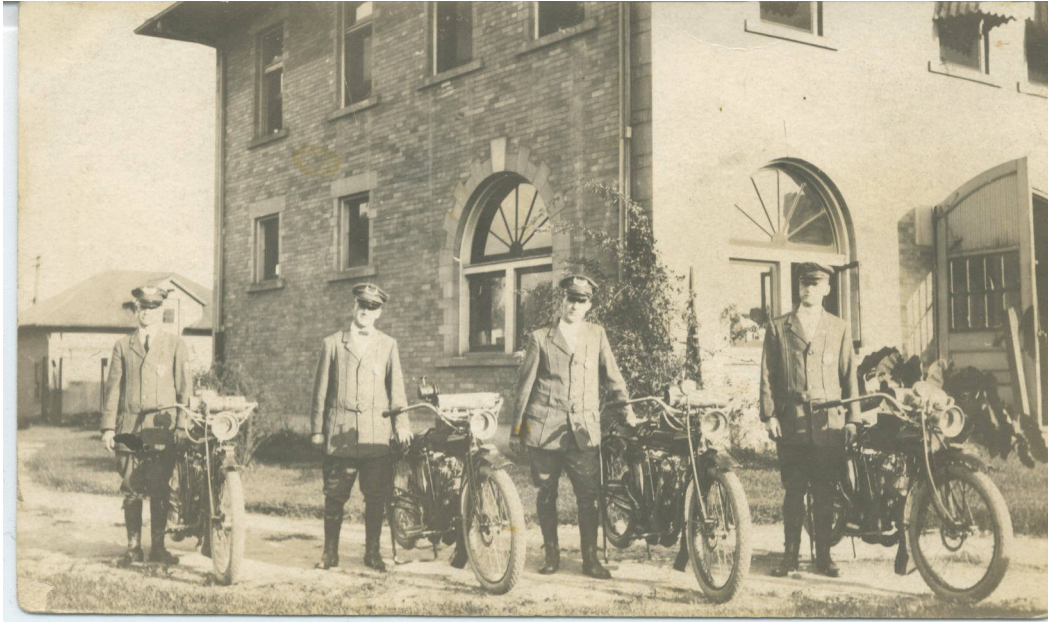

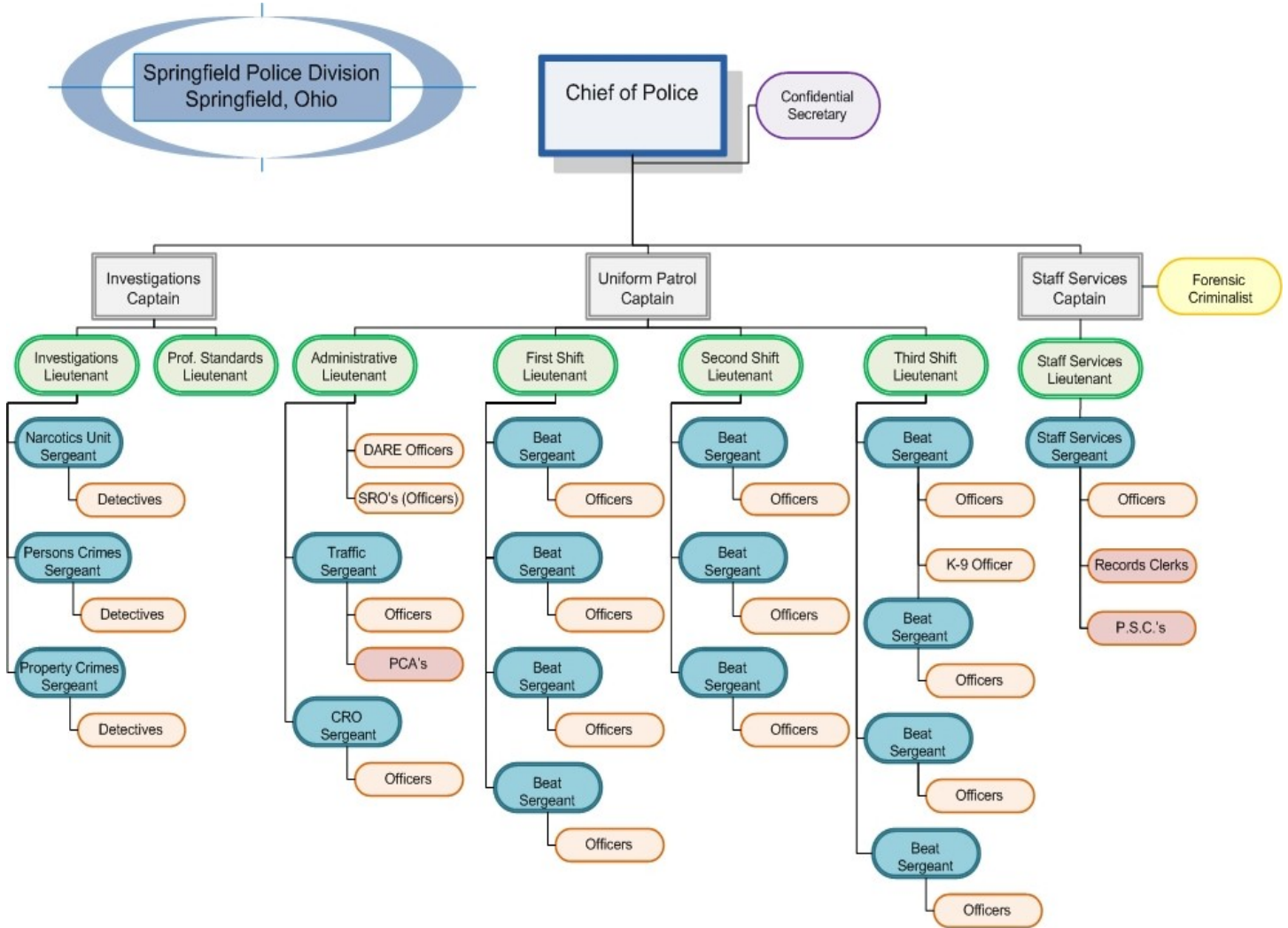
**Motor Officers circa 1913\***
