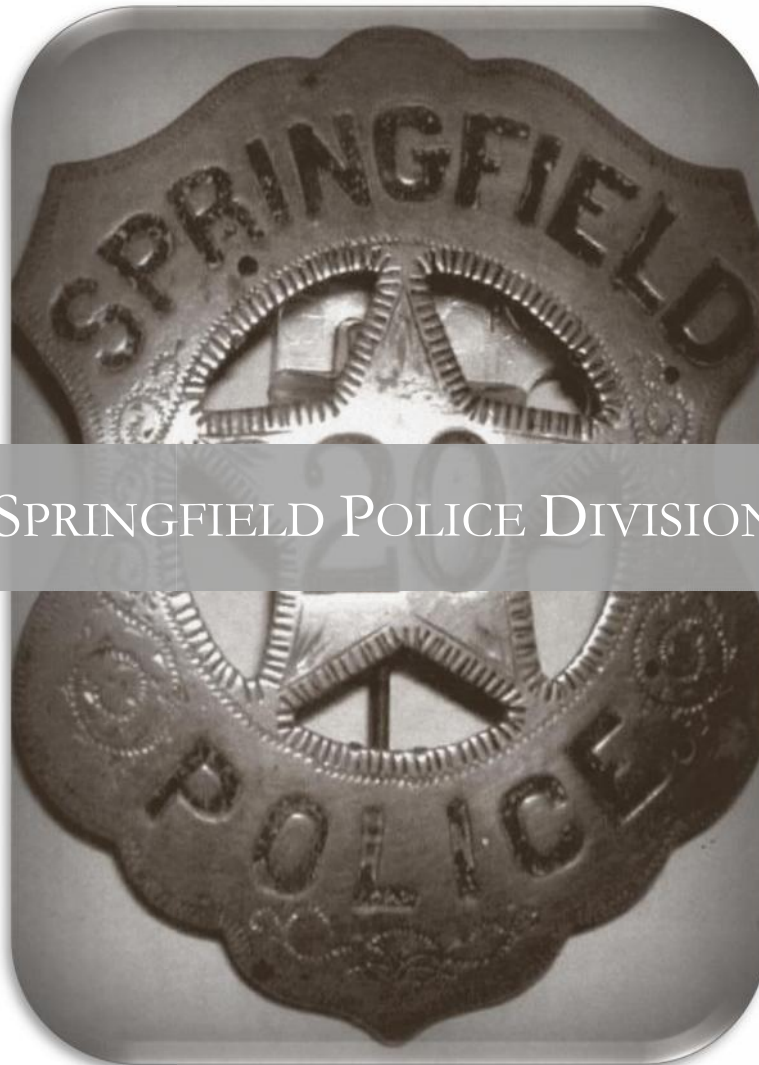

Message from the Chief of Police

Greetings:

Yearly, the Springfield Police Division compiles an annual report. This document is intended to provide the community with both an overview of the accomplishments of our agency and, to give us an opportunity to highlight those initiatives that have worked in the previous year.

The Springfield Police Division, comprised of 124 sworn police officer and 16 civilian staff members, continually seeks to work in collaboration with citizens, citizen groups, and businesses to reduce crime and enhance the quality of life in our city. Together, we have made significant progress with regard to the safety of our community. In fact, in 2012 we achieved another reduction in Part I crime (violent and property crimes). From 2011 to 2012 Part I crimes declined 3.68%. Over the past five years (2008 to 2012) Part I crimes in our community have fallen a significant 23.68%.

In 1829 Sir Robert Peel, the “father” of modern policing, said, “The test of police efficiency is the absence of crime and disorder, not the visible evidence of police action in dealing with it.” The decline in Part I crime in our city certainly reflects the efficiency, and effectiveness, of the men and women working to protect our community.

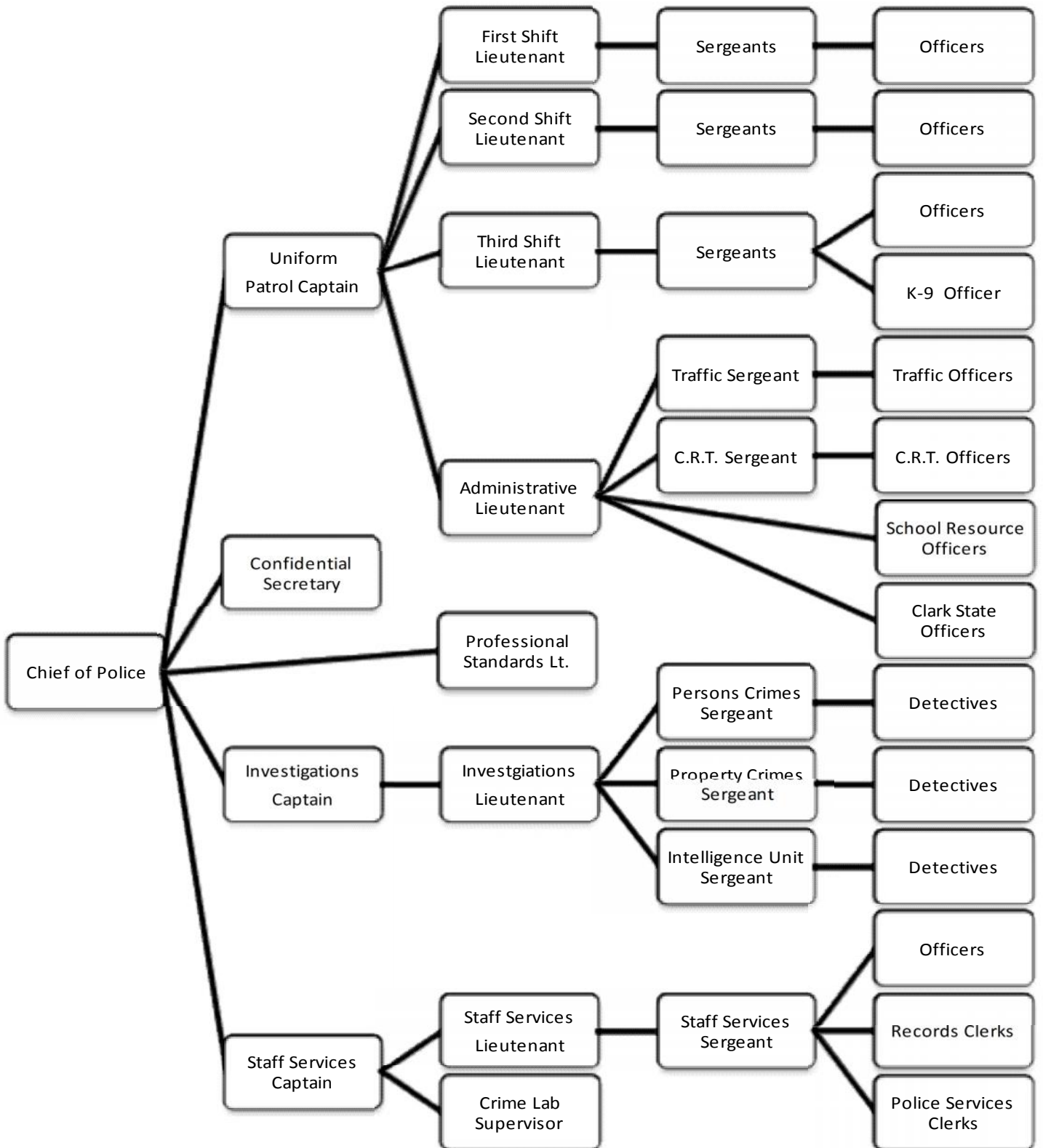

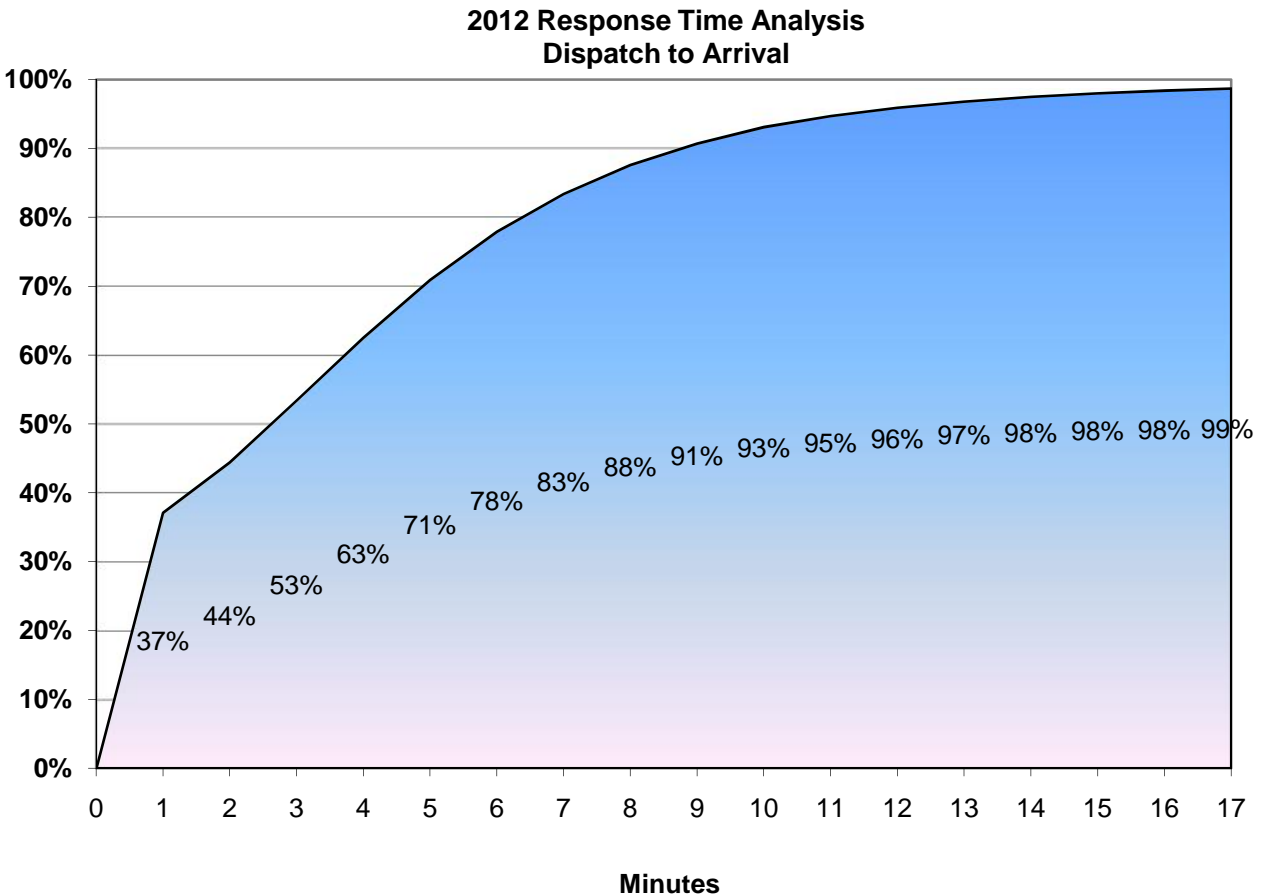

Uniform Patrol Sub-Division

The Uniform Patrol subdivision is the primary point of contact for all services we provide to the public and the largest within the agency. The subdivision operates from police headquarters (130 N. Fountain Av.), a sub-station (111 W. Johnny Lytle Street), the Clark State Community College Campus, the Metro Housing offices, and from within the middle schools and high school in our city. Officers assigned to Uniform Patrol respond to the needs of the public on a 24 hour a day, 7 day a week basis. These officers are responsible for performing preventative patrol throughout the city, responding to calls from citizens, conducting preliminary investigations with regard to all crimes reported, as well as enforcing both traffic and criminal law. During 2012 these officers responded to 37% of all calls for service in less than one minute and responded to 7% of all calls for service in less than five minutes.

Calls for Service

In 2012 there were 61,589 calls for service and/or officer initiated events; a 4.9% decrease from 2011.

*Down from 64,576 in 2011.

253 of the Calls for Service were responses that occurred outside the city limits.

These calls included follow up investigations and responses to crimes that occurred within the city limits.

1010 of the calls for service received in 2012 were cancelled prior to dispatch.

Traffic Division

Traffic Division Officers

The Traffic Division is responsible for parking control, radar speed enforcement, escort duty, and assisting the uniform patrol subdivision with regard to selective traffic enforcement and Traffic Crash Investigations. Traffic Division officers regularly conduct OVI Check-Points in conjunction with the Ohio State Highway Patrol and the Clark County Sheriff's Office. Traffic Division Officers are also responsible for follow up investigations red light camera violations and of hit and run crashes.

Parking Control Aides

Working out of the Traffic Division, the Parking Control Aides are tasked with removal of abandoned vehicles from the street, enforcing parking regulations, and assisting with traffic control whenever needed.

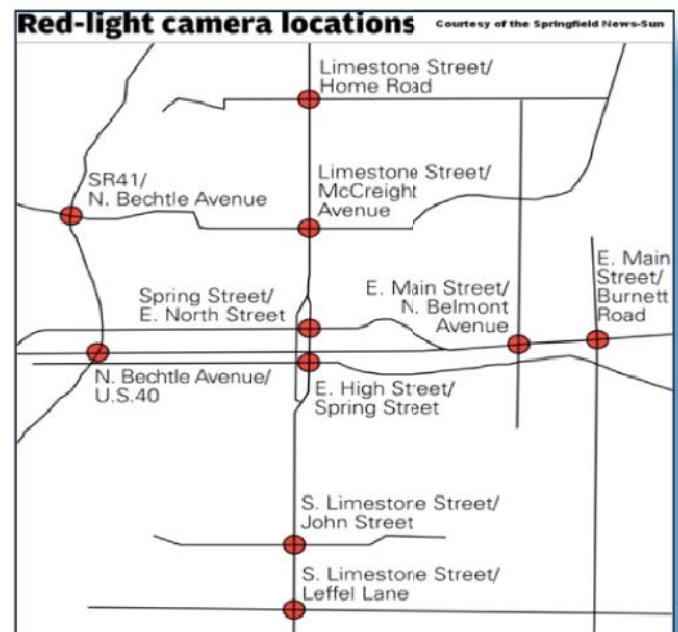

Community Response Team

Community Response Team (CRT) Officers work with citizens outside of the day-to-day calls for service on projects that are important to both the citizens, and the community. In addition to attending and participating in numerous neighborhood meetings and crime prevention presentations throughout 2012, they were involved in the following events:

- Though generous donations from the Elks Lodge #51 and Jim Twiggs Allstate Insurance, the CRT held our annual Bicycle Camp with 72 local children in attendance. The 2-week program enables the children attending the opportunity to learn safe bicycle riding techniques combined with team building skills as we traveled to various location via the bike trails of Springfield and Clark County.
- The CRT conducted a Neighborhood Block Party at the substation on Johnny Lytle St. in partnership with Fellowship Christian Church. The party included live bluegrass music & children's activities. The event was free and attended by approximately 250 area residents and children.
- Following a hiatus, the CRT made a return to the Clark County Fair. An outdoor booth and tent was set up with an obstacle course for children to complete. Those participating had to run the course wearing an SOT vest and "Fatal Vision," goggles. Volunteers from the Alumni Association and Elks Lodge 51 assisted with giveaway items.
- The CRT and Police Division conducted our 4th Annual Law Camp at Hayward Middle School. This event is a behind the scenes look at law enforcement and is modeled after our highly successful Citizens Police Academy. 45 local students attended the three-day event.
- The CRT organized a Blue Mass at St. Raphael Church to commemorate the 11th anniversary for the September 11th tragedy. Local law enforcement, fire and ems personnel attended the mass. The event was topped off with a wonderful bagpipe player.

- Officer Rich conducted a series of Safety Awareness programs for the Clark County Combined Health District. Specific programs were geared towards approximately 40 staff and participants from the Help Me Grow program. In addition, 5 separate clinics were conducted related to Women's Self Defense at Wittenberg University with 110 participants, some of which were male students. Safety Awareness programs were also conducted for staff at Ohio Valley Medical Center and United Senior Services.
- The CRT ended the 2012-year with our participation in the annual holiday programs of Operation Thanksgiving and Operation Santa. This year's program, made available through donations from Meijer, Wal-Mart, Springfield Command Officers Association, Citizens Police Academy Alumni Association, along with students from Shawnee High School and Springfield High School, in addition to generous private donations. The CRT was able to assist 9 families with traditional Thanksgiving dinners and groceries. The Christmas program allowed us to shop and assist 31 families that included 70 children. The event was topped off with a Christmas breakfast and a luncheon with Santa at the Johnny Lytle Substation. Food for those attending was prepared and provided by Oakwood Village, Lee's Famous Recipe, volunteers from Kiwanis and St. John's Lutheran Church.
- Of particular note: almost all of the events mentioned included the assistance of the Citizens Police Academy Alumni Association. Their dedication and support has great value to the division. This group of citizens donated 2010.5 hours of volunteer service in 2012.

School Resource Officers

Five (5) full time police officers are assigned to work directly with the Springfield City School district. These School Resource Officers, known as SROs, perform a number of functions within the schools. The SROs work to develop positive relationships between the students and police officers. They represent a positive role model to the youth of our community. They interact with the students on a variety of law enforcement topics that range from prevention practices to possible consequences as a result choices and decisions they make. They also participate with the Clark County Safe Communities Coalition, and brought the “Every 15 Minutes” program rotation to the Northeastern High School this year. The program was a single day event that involved a simulated a mock crash with a high school aged student killed as the result of an alcohol related crash. A high school student is then removed from class every fifteen minutes and kept from family and friends. This allows students and families to experience what it would be like to lose someone to an alcohol related crash. The SROs also presented abbreviated versions of “Every Fifteen Minutes” to Springfield High School and the Springfield Clark Career Technology Center. They delivered Prom Promise to Springfield High School in May and participated in the National Night Out event in August.

Clark State Community College

In January 2009 the City of Springfield entered into an agreement with Clark State Community College for the Springfield Police Division to provide police protection for the college community. The agreement provides two full-time police officers to be assigned to the college. The officers typically work from 7:00 am until 11:00 pm, Monday through Friday. In addition to providing a safe environment for students, faculty and staff, the officers assigned to these positions actively engage in crime prevention and public relations. The officers assigned to Clark State are on the Behavioral Intervention Team “BIT”, which assists students, faculty, and staff with mental health assistance if needed. Their tasks include mentoring several student cadets while providing security for Clark State’s 3600 students and two campuses.

Metropolitan Housing Authority Officers

Metropolitan Housing Authority Officers working closely with management and residents at the local public housing complexes to enforce laws, resolve problems, and provide a safe environment. The officer(s) assigned to this program work on any number of issues, as they relate to Housing property. Metro Officers are sworn police officers of the Division and have full authority to enforce and federal laws both on and off Metropolitan Housing property.



D.A.R.E

The Springfield Police Division is dedicated to the protection of children in the community. The division has been active in the D.A.R.E. program since 1990 and remains committed to the education of school children in the importance of leading drug free lives. The 2003-2004 school year re-introduced the city DARE program to the 7th grade, as a compliment to the regular 5th grade schedule. We realize that the future of any community lies within its children. The DARE officers work full time in the city schools as role models for children. The officers have specialized training and provide lesson plans, which educate students on the dangers and consequences of drug use. The Springfield Police Division has two (2) D.A.R.E. officers who, worked with 400 Safety City Students, taught 800 5th grade DARE students, and 800 7th grade DARE students. The DARE Officers presented the new 7th Grade curriculum this year which added segments on choices and peer pressure.

The DARE Officers also instructed 680 elementary students in the 3rd Grade a Safety Belt program to promote seat belt usage. The DARE officers hosted several skate parties during academic year and participated in the Memorial Day Parade with the DARE essay winners.

K-9 & Handler

Officer Mike Fredendall is the K-9 handler for the Springfield Police Division. He and Rambo, our current canine, completed a 200 hour course together in 2006. Mike and Rambo are State of Ohio certified and must re-certify every two years. They formally train together on a weekly basis, but informally train daily. Together they have been very successful in locating large amounts of drugs and drug related money.

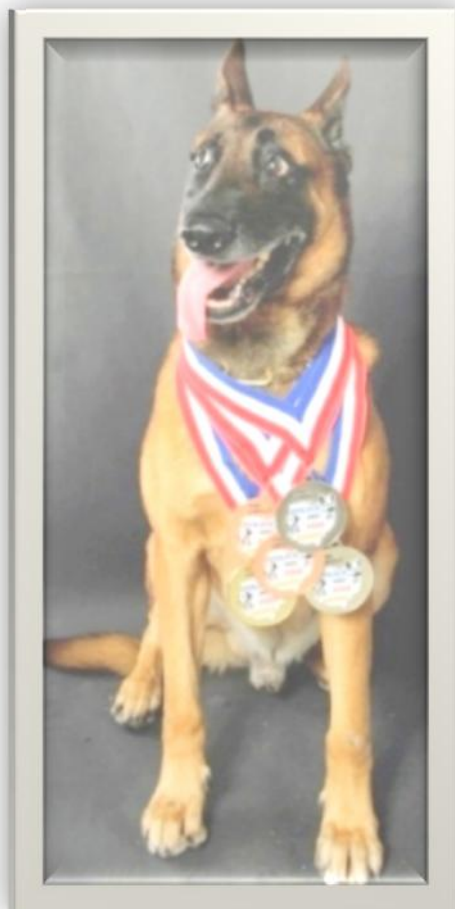

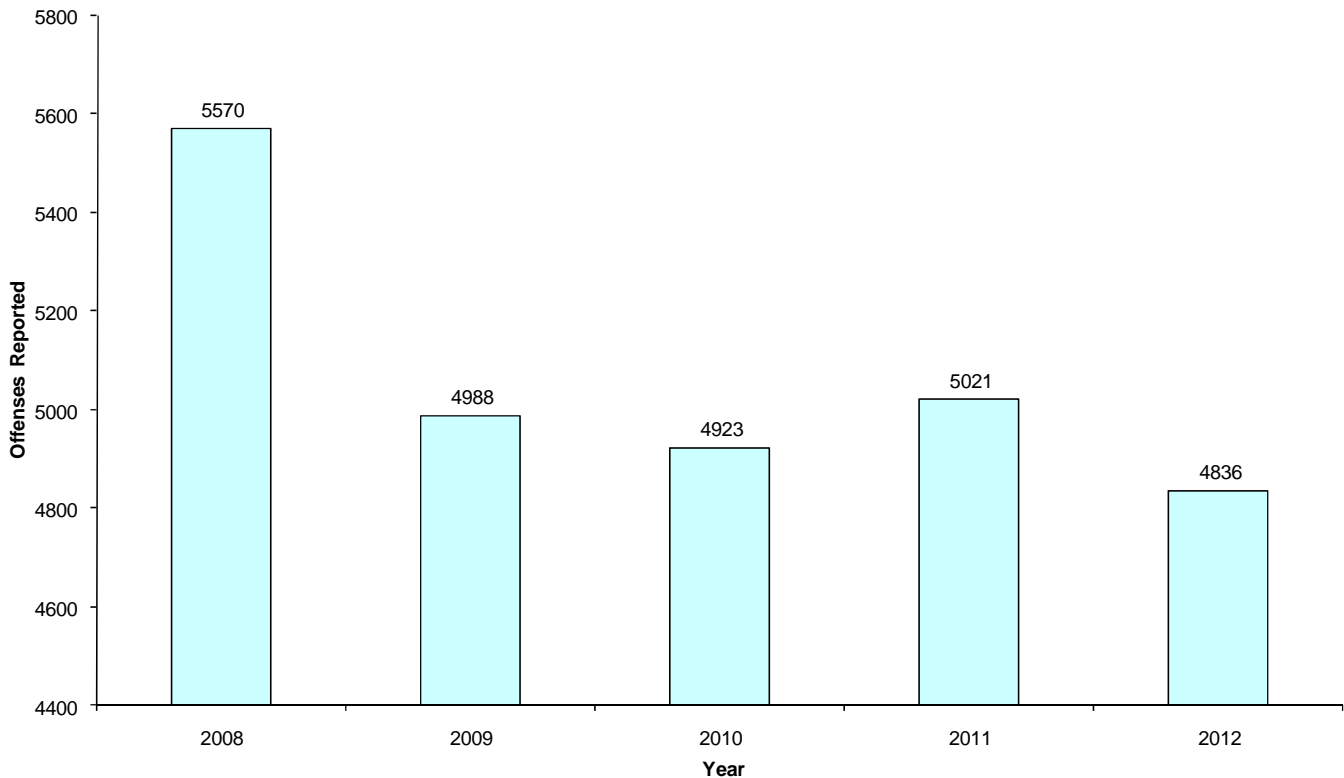


Investigations Sub-Division

The Investigations subdivision supports Uniform Patrol by providing initial and follow-up investigations for all crimes committed within the City of Springfield. There are currently 17 detectives, 3 sergeants, 1 lieutenant, and 1 captain assigned to the subdivision. Areas of concentration include Crimes against Persons (Assault, Homicide, Missing Persons, Rape, Robbery, etc.) Crimes against Property (Arson, Auto Theft, Fraud, Theft, Vandalism), and the Intelligence Unit (Prescription Drug Abuse, Narcotics Investigations, etc.) Each of the detectives is responsible for developing cases that not only lead to arrest, but successfully conclude with the conviction of the person or persons responsible for crime(s). The members of the Investigations Sub-Division work closely with the Clark County Prosecutors Office to this end. Their dedication is one of the major factors in the continued decline of Index Crime within our community.

Index Crime

Offenses Reported to Law Enforcement

- The level of Index Crime in Springfield dropped a significant 3.68% from 2011 to 2012.
- The Property Crime rate decreased 3.99% from 2011 to 2012.
- Auto thefts have continued to decline dramatically with another 14.5% drop from 2011 to 2012 and a five year decline of 51.28%.
- Robbery decreased 11% from 2011 to 2012.
- The increase in reported rape is directly related to rapes from prior years just now being reported.
- Although aggravated assaults did tick up slightly in 2012 they remain dramatically reduced from the 5 year highs.
- Arson investigators from the Springfield Fire Division, along with SPD detectives, are actively working to address the increase in arson reports.

Crime Scene Investigation

The Crime Scene Unit is responsible for the documentation and, along with the Regional Crime Lab, analysis of crime scenes. This can be a very large undertaking, as some crime scenes are very large and complicated. The officers assigned to the Crime Scene Unit have advanced training in this field and are utilized in major crime scene investigations. These officers are available on a 24 hour basis as situations arise. This unit is also responsible for the very large task of receiving, documenting, and storing all evidence and property received by the Police Division. Tens of thousands of items are received annually by this Unit. The effective handling of these items is essential to the prosecution of the guilty and the defense of the innocent. There is currently one lieutenant, one sergeant, two patrol officers, and one civilian assigned to the Crime Scene Unit. All Springfield Police Division Officers have basic training in evidence collection techniques.
