Education

The city school system includes a high school, a career technology center, 4 middle schools, 10 elementary schools, and 7 parochial schools. In addition, Clark State Community College and Wittenberg University are located within the city.

Library Services

The Clark County Public Library provides services through the main downtown facility, along with four branches and three bookmobiles. Over 300,000 volumes are available. A 100 seat meeting room is also available.

Water Supply

- The City's existing 12 wells are capable of producing 4.0 million gallons per day (MGD) each, for a combined capacity of 48.0 MGD of high quality groundwater.
- The City and Clark County work together to enforce a wellhead protection plan, developed in partnership with the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency.
- The City's treatment plant has a peak capacity of 36.0 MGD and is capable of sustained production of 20 MGD.
- The City's distribution system consists of about 333.73 miles of water mains, two booster stations, and four finished water reservoirs for a combined capacity of 9.5 MGD.
- The City has replaced every water meter in our system with meters that are read electronically.
- Current customer demand is only 12.6 MGD.
- The City has the ability to meet the supply needs of virtually any new customer. The City has the third lowest water rates in the Miami Valley region.

Wastewater Facilities

- The City of Springfield operates an Advanced Secondary Wastewater Treatment Plant.
- The Treatment plant has a rated treatment capacity of 25.0 MGD with the ability to handle up to 40 MDG during wet weather flow conditions.
- The average daily flow rate for 2012 was about 15.5 MGD, leaving ample capacity for new or expanding developments.
